Sticky Knowledge

- Understand that in 762 AD Baghdad was the capital of the Muslim world.
- Baghdad was the biggest city in the world with a population of about 1,000,000.
- Know that Baghdad was the world centre of culture and learning and this time period (762 AD – 1258 AD) was known as the Golden Age of Islam.
- Baghdad's Golden Age was at the same time as the Dark Ages in Britain
- The Silk Road was a network of trade routes which connected East and West
- The downfall of the Early Islamic Civilisation began with the invasion of the Mongol army
- The House of Wisdom was a centre of learning which helped preserve global knowledge from the ancient world
- The House of Wisdom advanced knowledge in Maths (including algebra), optics, chemistry and astronomy
