XBox Gaming Safety Toolkit

Many children and young people will be using Xbox gaming stations at home and as such Microsoft have put together quite a comprehensive toolkit (a PDF document) for parents, children and young people that goes into quite a lot of depth, including parental controls, guidance for all ages, common safety risks, bullying, unwanted contact and more. There is also age-specific guidance (from 5 years upwards) and case studies. The toolkit has been produced for gamers in Australia and new Zealand, but having read through I can see no reason at all why this can't be used by any person in any country, the information is all the same regardless.
