- The Tudors were part of the British Monarchy from 1485 to 1603. (Over 400 years ago)
- That Kings and Queens have ruled over Britain for centuries. (1200 years) a total of 61 monarchs.

Sticky Knowledge

The Tudors

- King Henry VIII had SIX wives. Remember: divorced, beheaded, died, divorced, beheaded, survived.
- The Tudors loved to watch people be beheaded. They would queue for hours with their children to watch the public executions!
- King Henry broke away from the main church of Rome, He made his own church, which he was the head of, so he could divorce his fourth wife.
- Elizabeth I made lots of different laws up. She would decide a new law everyday. Some were really odd, such as having to wear a blue hat on 'Tuesdays!'
- Queen Mary I (Henry VIII's daughter) became famous for killing Protestants who would not become Catholic.
